Summer 2022 Open Space Makes All the Difference





Summer is a great time to enjoy a trail walk!

SKLT's trails traverse diverse terrain, soils, ecosystems, and landscapes offering opportunities for hiking, botanizing, watching wildlife, nature journaling, photography, plein air painting, dog walking, and meditation in an unspoiled natural setting.

Mountain laurels will be the first to wake from their slumber and then rosebay rhododendrons burst into bloom. Yellow warblers are already flitting through the trees and ovenbirds stalk the understory.

Browning Woods Trail is a 3-mile trail that traces a "lollipop" through 259 acres of pine-oak woods, forested wetlands, and the ruins of the historic Browning Farm. SKLT manages approximately ten acres for early successional habitat on the northern edge of the property where briers, raspberries and cherries produce nutritious fruits for wildlife.

The DuVal Trail system offers a cardiovascular workout over its 4.5 mile of trails connecting 274 acres of hilly and sandy glacial moraine. Huckleberry, pitch pine, laurels and oaks thrive on its ridges and hollows. Its highest point is over 240 feet above sea level just south of Sand Plains Trail.

One of our newest trails is at Alewife Brook Preserve on Wordens Pond Road. The 1.1-mile trail system skirts the edge of the forested swamp along the Alewife Brook, an unspoiled natural watershed. If you listen carefully, you may hear singing hooded warblers and be lucky to catch the sight of one!

Finally, explore family friendly Tefft Historical Park Trail, accessible from stairs next to the William C. O'Neill (South County) Bike Path in between Ministerial and South Roads. This beautiful 30-acre property boasts deep history with two historic cemeteries, hilly terrain, and trail improvements recently completed by Eagle Scouts.

URI's Tick Encounter Resource Center, uri.edu/tickencounter, provides great just-in-time information if you find yourself wondering how to avoid picking up any hitch hiking ticks on your walk.



These accomplishments and the positive momentum created for the community are all thanks to you, our devoted supporters.



South Kingstown Land Trust would like to wish a happy 200th birthday to Edward Everett Hale, who was born on April 3, 1822 and died on June 10, 1909. Hale was a famous American author, historian, and Unitarian minister. SKLT is proud to own and preserve the Hale Family's summertime home, now known as the Hale House. Built in 1873, it served as the family gathering place for decades and became the center of a vibrant summer colony.

The Hale House opens on June 16th for the 2022 season! Visitors can book a guided tour by advance reservation on select Fridays and Saturdays through August. Call 401-830-4677 to make a reservation. There is no charge, but a \$5 per person suggested donation to help offset the costs of providing tours.

The Hale House's summer programs begin with an Open House on June 16th from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Neighbor and SKLT Board Director Elise Torello has become well known for her wonderful wildlife camera trapping captures around Matunuck. She will share a video presentation, *Matunuck Hills Safari!*, featuring the diverse animal populations in our backyards. He served as a Supervising Planner for 12 years, assisting municipalities in the development of local comprehensive plans and overseeing reviews of various projects and grants for consistency with State and local plans.

Over the course of his career, many of his duties have been connected to environmental issues. These include serving on the Governor's Advisory Committee on Natural Heritage Preservation, the R.I. Resource Conservation & Development Council's Environment and Water Quality Committee, the R.I. Rivers Council, the R.I. Agricultural Lands Preservation Commission, the R.I. Trails Advisory Committee, and the R.I. Recreational Resources Review Committee. He also served as a technical advisor to the State Conservation Committee and as staff to the R.I. Greenways Council.

Kevin was a member of the Galilee Salt Marsh Restoration Team for which he received a Certificate of Appreciation from Coastal America. In addition to his professional experience, Kevin has served as a Vice-President for both the R.I. Wild Plant Society and the Environment Council of R.I.

Community Informs SKLT's New Strategic Plan with Survey

As the Land Trust embarks on its new strategic plan for 2022 and beyond, the best way to serve you and the entire community was to find out what you think!

A short survey was launched through the SKLT e-mail newsletter, social media channels, website, and trailhead posters. We received hundreds of thoughtful responses which will directly inform the new strategic plan from board decisions to everyday operations.

Survey highlights include:

- 98% found land conservation and public access to be very important or extremely important
- 77% found protecting open space, wildlife habitat, and drinking water to be extremely important
- SKLT events found most interesting were Lectures (76%), Open Houses (61%), the Great Outdoors Celebration (59%), and Guided Hikes (57%) but 72% indicated time/other commitments as barriers

Guided Hike at Browning Woods Trail

Friday, July 8th (9:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m.)

Explore thriving habitat on a 2.5 mile hike that travels by the historical stone walls and foundations of Browning Woods Farm. You'll be sure to hear raucous birdsong, find some wildlife tracks, and learn more about the landscape of this 259-acre property.



Friday, August 12th (9:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m.)

Join the first Guided Hike at SKLT's newest trail tucked in between the South County Bike Path and the Tefft Hill neighborhoods. The meandering 1.1-mile trail passes by cemeteries and foundations from the historic Tefft Farm in a now peaceful wooded setting.



Friday, September 9th (9:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m.)

Take a walk under the glow of September's Harvest Moon on the trails beside Weeden Farm's thriving agricultural fields. You'll learn the history of Weeden Farm, listen for owls and other nocturnal wildlife, and enjoy s'mores by the campfire.


