Until recently, mushroom hunting has remained a very obscure part of our culture. The general reaction to the idea of eating wild mushrooms is one of astonishment, or even outright fear. I certainly remember being warned to stay well away from mushrooms as a little kid!

Most parents and teachers are concerned that children will get poisoned by touching wild mushrooms, even though that's not actually possible; even with those few species that are deadly, a person can handle them all day and even squish them with their hand without fear. To get poisoned by a poisonous mushroom, it takes actually ingesting it. Sure enough, there is a real danger if someone eats wild mushrooms carelessly; but in our culture, one gets the general impression that they are quite menacing.

And yet, in our travels, like at our SKLT lecture in February, Emily and I run into so many Rhode Islanders that do know about wild mushrooms already. We have met in particular a lot of Polish and Italian mushroom hunters; and plenty of others too. Many of these people have fond memories of family members foraging and cooking special mushrooms.

But a lot of those relatives were reluctant to teach the younger generations in America about the mushrooms they knew. This was often because, although some mushrooms' visual features can be recognized easily, they are hard to describe if you don't know mycological vocabulary words. These people figured, rather than teach their kids about species identification with a dangerously confusing lesson, best not to teach them at all.

Another factor is that many young Americans are embarrassed by older family foraging for mushrooms. "Grandma, please don't offer to cook those mushrooms for my friends...everyone is asking if you're a witch or something! This is America, where we eat modern food...you know, from factories." As a result, these family traditions have been lost over the years. Emily and I are able to help people reconnect to their own traditions, and it's one of the things we are proudest of. But the majority of our audiences are people who have never tried wild mushrooms.

That's exactly where we were ourselves, a dozen years ago. With a little bit of science, though, it's quite easy to do, in complete safety. And luckily, people are starting to figure out that food from factories isn't so cool after all, and that foraging for delicious ingredients in your own local forest, is. People can explore old cooking traditions from their own heritage, or different parts of the world; and even more exciting, they can come up with brand new ideas of their own.

Mushroom hunting really is a whole new world of astonishing colors, shapes, textures, aromas, and flavors. We hope you take an interest in learning about it through the Mushroom Hunting Foundation.

Weekly Volunteer Work Days

SKLT depends on volunteer support for all aspects of our mission. With 178 properties spanning 3,100+ acres and 15 miles of public hiking trails, nothing is more important than the active land management and maintenance of the protected land in our care.

In 2021, SKLT launched Weekly Volunteer Work Days to create a consistent schedule of opportunities and cultivate an engaged crew of volunteers.

Projects include trail clearing, invasive plant removal, wildlife habitat enhancement, stonewall and historic foundation repair, and much more.

Meet the spotted lanternfly (Lycorma delicatula), a sap-feeding insect native to Asia. But, no, it is not your friend.

The invasive pest, not a fly but a plant-hopper, has caused extensive damage to crops in the Mid-Atlantic region and has since migrated north, with the first being found in Rhode Island in August 2021. Within a year, its numbers exploded, and it has become well established in areas of Smithfield.


It's voracious and varied appetite is devastating to important trees such as maples and black walnuts and crop plants such as grapevines, apple, plum, cherry, peach, and apricot. The insects remove significant amounts of sap from the plant, and the sooty mold can contaminate the berries.

Spotted lanternflies' preferred host is its fellow invasive species from Asia, the tree-of-heaven (*Ailanthus altissima*), a rapidly growing deciduous tree that was widely planted decades ago for erosion control or as an ornamental tree.

WHAT TO DO: In January 2023, SKLT identified a large tree-of-heaven at Weeden Farm (*above*) and decided to take it down to eliminate the possibility of a future infestation. If you do decide to remove a tree-of-heaven from your yard, just be aware that cutting this tree encourages shoots, so dig out the entire plant, or apply a herbicide to the cut trunk.

Spotted lanternfly egg masses that are accessible can be scraped off and destroyed. Use a stick, plastic card, or similar tool to scrape eggs into a container filled with alcohol, hand sanitizer or soapy water to kill the eggs. Simply mashing eggs is often not entirely effective.

Biscuit City Preserve in Kingston is a restored historical area that includes hiking trails, natural plantings, the ruins of the old Biscuit City Mill, and its most prominent feature, Scott Evans Memorial Pond.

The pond was dedicated to Scott Evans, a child who was struck by a car while fishing from a bridge and died in 1974. In its early days, the pond was dredged and stocked with trout by the RI DEM but over time the pond filled in with silt and was eventually dropped from the stocking program. Ellen Grebstein, a Biscuit City neighbor and SKLT Board Director spearheaded the effort to restore the pond habitat and youth fishing.

2019 marked the reopening of the pond as a youth fishing pond thanks to the combined efforts of SKLT and the RI DEM. Perhaps the best feature of the site is easy handicap access and ample parking, making it ideal for young children, parents and grandparents.

Want to teach your kids how to fish? Join the opening day of trout season at Biscuit City on Saturday, April 8th!

The pond will be stocked with brook and rainbow trout by RI DEM beforehand. Fishing starts at 6:00 a.m. Staff and volunteers will be on site to assist until 4:00 p.m. Only children ages 14 and under may fish.

Visitors may also have the opportunity to meet the male beaver who moved into the pond in the summer of 2021.




